All of these persons had been invited, but not all of them could for various reasons attend the ball. Taking this into account and the fact that about 223 people had been invited, the actual number of those who did must have been somewhere around 200. ¹²

In going through the list of those who were invited it becomes clear that a relative high number of members of the Foot Guards had been invited while the Netherlands, Nassau, Hanoverian and Brunswick were very poorly represented, apart from the duke of Brunswick and the prince of Orange.

2. The countess of Oultremont, born countess Van der Noot de Duras, was the widow of the prince Louis de Ligne, son of the famous marshal. From him she had a child, a son, Eugène, prince de Ligne, who was at the ball, despite his very low age.

3. He was a minister of Louis XVIII in The Hague.

4. General Von Müffling is missing here, though he must have been invited.
